The Light of the World 2015-04-21 in this deep and engaging meditation on the usefulness and uselessness of reading in the digital age harvard english professor marjorie garber aims to reclaim literature from the periphery of our personal educational and professional lives and restore it to the center as a radical way of thinking but what is literature anyway how has it been understood over time and what is its relevance for us today who gets to decide what the word means why has literature been on the defensive since plato does it have any use at all other than serving as bourgeois or aristocratic accoutrements attesting to one's worldly sophistication and refinement of spirit what are the boundaries that separate it from its commercial instance and from other more mundane kinds of writing is it as most of us assume good to read much less study and what would that mean

Ten Thousand Saints 2011-06-07 a multigenerational family drama about grief motherhood and coming of age all taking place on an ohio farm joan chase's subtle story of three generations of women negotiating lifetimes of joy and ruin deserves its place alongside such achievements as marilynne robinson's housekeeping and alice munro's lives of girls and women the queen of persia is not an exotic figure but a fierce ohio farmwife who presides over a household of daughters and granddaughters

the novel tells their stories through the eyes of the youngest members of the family four cousins who spend summers on the farm for them both a life giving eden and the source of terrible discoveries about desire and loss the girls bicker and scrap they whisper secrets at bedtime and above all they observe the kinds of women their mothers are and wonder what kind of women they will become but always present is the family s great trauma the decline and eventual death from cancer of gram s daughter grace a powerful story about family ties and tensions during the reign of the queen of persia is also a book about place charting the transformation of the old hardscrabble midwest into the commercial wilderness of modern america

A World Out of Reach 2020-11-24 taije silverman s debut collection chronicles her family s devotion and dissolution through the death of her mother ranging in style from measured narratives to fragmented lyrics that convey the ambiguity of loss these poems both arc into the past and question the possibility of the future exploring the ways in which memory at once sustains and fails love ultimately the poems are elegies not only to one beloved mother but to the large and diffusive presences of keats mandelstam a concentration camp near prague a coming of age on a greek island and the nearly traceless particles of neutrinos that as with each detail toward which the poet lends her attention become precious as the mother departs from her position at the center of the world furious redemptive and deeply immediate houses are fields is a beautifully moving first book

The Favorite Daughter 2019-06-04 from one of america s foremost young literary voices a transcendent portrait of the unbearable anguish of grief and the enduring power of familial love what does it mean to mourn today in a culture that has largely set aside rituals that acknowledge grief after her mother died of cancer at the age of fifty five meghan o rourke found that nothing had prepared her for the intensity of her sorrow in the first anguished days she began to create a record of her interior

Modern Loss 2018-01-23 the renowned novel from crime fiction master raymond chandler with the quintessential urban private eye los angeles times philip marlowe featuring the iconic character that inspired the film marlowe starring liam neeson in noir master raymond chandler s the long goodbye philip marlowe befriends a down on his luck war veteran with the scars to prove

it then he finds out that terry lennox has a very wealthy nymphomaniac wife whom he divorced and remarried and who ends up dead and now lennox is on the lam and the cops and a crazy gangster are after marlowe

Women's Work 2020-03-03 hard damage works to relentlessly interrogate the self and its shortcomings in lyric and documentary poems and essayistic fragments aria aber explores the historical and personal implications of afghan american relations drawing on material dating back to the 1950s she considers the consequences of these relations in particular the funding of the afghan mujahedeen which led to the taliban and modern day islamic terrorism for her family and the world at large invested in and suspicious of the pain of family and the shame of selfhood the speakers of these richly evocative and musical poems mourn the magnitude of citizenship as a state of place and a state of mind while hard damage is framed by free verse poetry the middle sections comprise a lyric essay in fragments and a long documentary poem aber explores rilke in the original german the urban melancholia of city life inherited trauma and displacement on both linguistic and environmental levels while employing surrealist and eerily domestic imagery

The Long Goodbye 1988-08-12 a work of literature beautifully written meticulously structured and heart rending observer what if you knew from the beginning how your relationship was going to end when jill hopper first met arif they were living in a shared house on the island of osney in the river thames surrounded by willow trees birds and reflections it was an idyllic home but no sooner had they begun to fall in love than arif was given the news that he had only a few months to live everyone told jill to walk away but she was already in too deep years later jill rediscovers arif s parting gift an african seedpod and finally sets out to trace the elusive patterns that shaped their relationship the mahogany pod is a tender and vital account of what it means to live and love fully

This Boy's Life 2007-12-01 the poems in this captivating collection weave beauty with violence the personal with the historic as they recount the harrowing experiences of the two hundred thousand female victims of rape and torture at the hands of the pakistani army during the 1971 liberation war as the child of bangladeshi immigrants the poet in turn explores her own losses as well as the complexities of bearing witness to the atrocities these war heroines endured throughout the volume the narrator endeavors to bridge generational and cultural gaps even as the victims recount the horror of grief and personal loss as we read we discover the profound yet fragile seam that unites the fields rivers

and prisons of the 1971 war with the poet's modern day hotel or the tragic death of a loved one with the holocaust of a nation moving from west texas to dubai from virginia to remote villages in bangladesh and back again the narrator calls on the legacies of willa cather césar vallejo tomas tranströmer and paul celan to give voice to the voiceless fierce yet loving devastating and magical at once seam is a testament to the lingering potency of memory and the bravery of a nation's victims winner great lakes colleges association new writers award 2014 winner binghamton university milt kessler poetry book award 2015 winner drake university emerging writers award 2015

Dead Mom Walking 2020-03-31 if you're a fan of sally rooney's work then you can't go wrong by picking up a copy of *Topics of Conversation* she's a fresh voice and one that it's certainly worth listening to vogue miranda popkey's debut explores the paradox of longing to assert control and longing to lose it she depicts what it feels like to exist actually live at that intersection which can so often bring about paralysis new yorker what is the shape of a life is it the things that happen to us or is it the stories we tell about the things that happen to us from the coast of the adriatic to the salt spray of santa barbara the narrator of *Topics of Conversation* maps out her life through two decades of bad relationships motherhood crisis and consolation the novel unfurls through a series of conversations in private with friends late at night at parties with acquaintances with strangers in hotel rooms in moments of revelation shame cynicism envy and intimacy sizzling with enigmatic desire miranda popkey's debut novel is a seductive exploration of life as a woman in the modern world of the stories we tell ourselves and of the things we reveal only to strangers

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
