this true life thriller describes juan pujol a poultry farmer who opposed the nazis and concocted a series of staggering lies that lead to his becoming one of germany s most valued spies while actually acting as a double agent for the allies 35 000 first printing a remarkable story of a forgotten seventeen year old jew who was blamed by the nazis for the anti semitic violence and terror known as the kristallnacht the pogrom still seen as an initiating event of the holocaust after learning about nazi persecution of his family herschel grynszpan pronounced greenspan bought a small handgun and on november 7 1938 went to the german embassy and shot the first german diplomat he saw when the man died two days later hitler and goebbels made the shooting their pretext for the state sponsored wave of antisemitic terror known as kristallnacht still seen by many as an initiating event of the holocaust overnight grynszpan a bright but naive teenager was front page news and a pawn in a global power struggle mein kampf is the autobiography of adolf hitler gives detailed insight into the mission and vision of adolf hitler that shook the world this book is the merger of two volumes the first volume of mein kampf was written while the author was imprisoned in a bavarian fortress the book deals with events which brought the author into this blight it was the hour of germany s deepest humiliation when napolean has dismembered the old german empire and french soldiers occupied almost the whole of germony the books narrates how hitler was arrested with several of his comrades and imprisoned in the fortress of landsberg on the river lech during this period only the author wrote the first volume of mein kampf the second volume of mein kampf was written after release of hitler from prison and it was published after the french had left the ruhr the tramp of the invading armies still echoed in german ears and the terrible ravages had plunged the country into a state of social and economic chaos the beauty of the book is mein kampf is an historical document which bears the emprint of its own time moreover hitler has declared that his acts and public statements constitute a partial revision of his book and are to be taken as such also the author has translated hitler s ideal the volkischer staat as the people s state the author has tried his best making german vocabulary easy to understand you will never be satisfied until go through the whole book a must read book which is one of the most widely circulated and read books worldwide the day before the war recounts the little known events along the german polish border on august 31 1939 that ignited the second world war in europe germany contrived a series of false flag attacks on german facilities along the frontier using specially trained ss men dressed as polish insurgents and soldiers to carry out the attacks the highlight of these was the german radio station in gleiwitz today gliwice poland where the rebels would broadcast their message to the world providing clear evidence of polish aggression against germany the day before the war is an ideal length for a quick reading of the origins of world war ii in europe it is ideal as supplementary reading for high school and college history courses covering world war ii and its causes 1 may 1945 the world did not know it yet but the final week of the third reich s existence had begun hitler was dead but the war had still not ended everything had both ground to a halt and yet remained agonizingly uncertain volker ullrich s remarkable book takes the reader into a world torn between hope and terror describing how each day unfolds with hitler dead berlin in ruins and the war undoubtedly lost the process by which the fighting would end remained horrifyingly unclear many major nazis were still on the loose wild rumours continued to circulate about a last stand in the alps and the western allies falling out with the soviet union all over europe millions of soldiers prisoners slave labourers and countless

exhausted grief stricken and often homeless families watched and waited for the war's end eight days in may is the story of people in erich k stner's striking phrase stuck in the gap between no longer and not yet the astonishing true story of a childhood journey from the occupied channel islands to the dark heart of a german prison camp this book is an unusual memoir about the childhood and young adulthood of sarah lew miller born in a large orthodox jewish family in dereczyn poland sarah's family moved to paris in 1937 to escape poverty the german occupation of france just three years later threatened her family's existence with repressive anti jewish laws and massive deportations of jews to death camps with the help of christian neighbors they evaded arrest for several years in paris after sarah's mother was arrested and then rescued sarah's parents went into deep hiding while their eight children found refuge in rural villages scattered around france through the help of a french resistance organization the sixième sarah escaped to switzerland in may 1944 this personal and historical account of an era conveys the day to day life of a teenage girl living in nazi occupied france with the ever present threat of death despite her loneliness hardships and the derailment of her childhood dreams she kept her strong family ties and maintained her faith in humanity this memoir demonstrates the qualities of resilience and courage that enabled individuals and families such as sarah's to survive by reliving one family's way of coping with a social and political crisis we learn of nine and a half weeks a moving and profound exploration of the legacy of war and hate on an individual life born in austria at the height of world war ii ingeborg day grew up knowing little about the early years of her life when she came to america in 1957 as an exchange student she heard for the first time references to hitler nazis and the holocaust topics that were forbidden in her homeland and her own house day married an american and stayed in the u s permanently a separation that created great physical and psychological distance between herself and her father a nazi nobody an out of work locksmith's apprentice who ended up joining the austrian army where his musical talents blossomed in a military band an early member of the nazi party he was automatically incorporated into the ss after the anschluss in 1938 but with the fall of the third reich he refused to speak of the past determined to remain silent ghost waltz day's astonishing and beautiful memoir tells of her efforts germany had marched across europe bringing the blitzkrieg the holocaust and the mad dreams of adolf hitler across the bloodied landscape of europe france had fallen and until the americans joined the battle in december 1941 the balance of power was securely in the hands of the third reich but even as the allied forces joined together under the leadership of supreme allied commander general dwight d eisenhower germany continued to win battles in order for the nazis to be stopped the allies had to invade occupied europe and invade they did launching the most massive amphibious landing the world had ever seen inside you will read about countdown to d day supreme allied commander dwight d eisenhower the invasion planning is underway a day in june the german response the invasion end game and much more the pantheon of heroes of the normandy invasion includes soldiers who are unknown except for the crosses that bear their names in the cemeteries where they were buried but all those who died days after hitler looks at these days as a narrative day by day countdown but also as a broader global history of a european war that had seen some of the most savage battles in history relations between the big three the united states great britain and the soviet union suddenly plunged to near breaking point this book reveals that tumultuous story after hitler also looks at the wider canvas of the war and the terrible humanitarian catastrophe uncovered in europe it describes those who felt the joy of freedom but also those who faced a highly uncertain future as red army soldiers joined goodwill and co operation the brief but poignant hope that these great nations could together fashion a new and safer future this is a fascinating exploration of the brief but crucial period that shaped the emerging post war world this new hardcover edition of odd nansen s diary the first in over sixty five years contains extensive annotations and other material not found in any other hardcover or paperback versions nansen a norwegian was arrested in 1942 by the nazis and spent the remainder of world war ii in concentration camps grini in oslo veidal above the arctic circle and sachsenhausen in germany for three and a half years nansen kept a secret diary on tissue paper thin pages later smuggled out by various means including inside the prisoners hollowed out breadboards unlike writers of retrospective holocaust memoirs nansen recorded the mundane and horrific details of camp life as they happened from day to day with an unsparing eye nansen described the casual brutality and random terror that

was the fate of a camp prisoner his entries reveal his constantly frustrated hopes for an early end to the war his longing for his wife and children his horror at the especially barbaric treatment reserved for jews and his disgust at the anti semitism of some of his fellow norwegians nansen often confronted his german jailors with unusual outspokenness and sometimes with a sense of humor and absurdity that was not appreciated by his captors after the putnam s edition received rave reviews in 1949 the book fell into obscurity in 1956 in response to a poll about the most undeservedly neglected book of the preceding quarter century carl sandburg singled out from day to day calling it an epic narrative which took its place among the great affirmations of the power of the human spirit to rise above terror torture and death indeed nansen witnessed all the horrors of the camps yet still saw hope for the future he sought reconciliation with the german people even donating the proceeds of the german edition of his book to german refugee relief work nansen was following in the footsteps of his father fridtjof an arctic explorer and humanitarian who was awarded the nobel peace prize in 1922 for his work on behalf of world war i refugees fridtjof also created the nansen passport for stateless persons forty sketches of camp life and death by nansen an architect and talented draftsman provide a sense of immediacy and acute observation matched by the diary entries the preface is written by thomas buergenthal who was tommy the ten year old survivor of the auschwitz death march whom nansen met at sachsenhausen and saved using his extra food rations buergenthal author of a lucky child formerly served as a judge on the international court of justice at the hague and is a recipient of the 2015 elie wiesel award from the us holocaust memorial museum an poignant and timeless true story of one child s journey to a german prison camp during world war ii the day the nazis came is an utterly unique memoir depicting the world of prison camps through the eyes of a child our narrator s parents did their best to protect his emotional well being downplaying the extent of dangers and presenting every new day as an adventure but there is only so much you can do to hide such a dark truth and by the time he was six years old stephen matthews had actually seen and experienced things of unspeakable horror he had witnessed a bombardment by the luftwaffe and had been deported from occupied guernsey along with his family to a prison camp in the heart of adolf hitler s third reich he had seen men die in front of him he had walked alongside jews coming straight off the cattle trucks from bergen belsen he had nearly drowned been menaced by an alsatian guard dog and had his hand broken by a german guard for attempting to feed russian prisoners against all odds stephen and his family endured over three years of imprisonment held together by their will to survive their love for each other and the humor they had all been gifted with but when the war ended and they were set free the home they eventually returned to had been irremediably scarred and stricken by nazi occupation and so once again they had to fight to pick up the pieces supported by and enriched with his mother s diary notes which had been secreted away in an old leather bound family bible throughout the years in the camp the day the nazis came is a phenomenal piece of history as well as a heart wrenching account of the horrors of the war and deportation it is above all a heart warming tribute to the preciousness of hope of life and of the indomitable spirit of man to survive and while honoring the memory of the three courageous germans who risked everything to protect as many as the prisoners in their charge as they could it also shows how human kindness may flower and prevail in the unlikelyst of places on november 7 1938 17 year old herschel grynszpan shot third secretary ernst von rath in paris setting off the night of broken glass and the holocaust examining german documents never before revealed including a startling coded confession schwab probes the background of grynszpan and demonstrates the power of the human spirit against overwhelming odds the story of how germans came to embrace the third reich germany in early 1933 was a country ravaged by were consumed by everyone from factory workers to housewives to german soldiers in fact troops were encouraged and in some cases ordered to take rations of a form of crystal meth the elevated energy and feelings of invincibility associated with the high even help to account for the breakneck invasion that sealed the fall of france in 1940 as well as other german military victories hitler himself became increasingly dependent on injections of a cocktail of drugs ultimately including eukodal a cousin of heroin administered by his personal doctor thoroughly researched and rivetingly readable blitzed throws light on a history that until now has remained in the shadows delightfully nuts the new yorker the story behind d day begins in 1939 when nazi germany led by adolf hitler attacked poland and ignited world war two the following year the germans occupied france and western europe and launched a vicious air war against britain in 1941 they invaded the soviet union seemingly unstoppable the nazis now held virtually all of europe they imposed a ruthless system of control and unleashed the horror of the holocaust however by 1943 the tide had begun to turn in favor of the allies the forces opposed to germany in the east despite huge losses the soviets began to force the germans back one of the most painfully riveting books of our time a first hand account of the greatest mass murder in history as told by the active and passive participants in genocide what is different about this book is that it contains carefully compiled letters journal entries and voluminous correspondence that prove beyond doubt that more members of the german population than ever before admitted to knew about the holocaust while it was happening sibert honor author deborah
