join beanie the spider as she floats flies and sails the seas of imagination in book 2 of this fun artsy adventure series in this story beanie helps a new friend while going on a new make believe adventure in her fine art gallery taking place in a fine art gallery featuring real artwork adventures of beanie the spider is a creative way to introduce children to art galleries and spark interest in the arts inspired by a spider living on one of christine s paintings it s a sweet story about imagination adventure and friendship written in rhyme it s fun for adults to read to children and for young independent readers a repeatable favorite for the whole family enjoy engaging after the story activities at the end of the book a major contribution to grass scholarship that looks at his career as a whole and identifies four phases or stages of his writing in terms of communicative strategy and style within the vast network of nazi camps stutthof may be the least known beyond poland this book is the first scholarly publication in english to break the silence of stutthof where 120 000 people were interned and at least 65 000 perished a nazi camp near danzig offers an overview of stutthof s history it also explores danzig s significance in promoting the cult of german nationalism which led to stutthof s establishment and

which shaped its subsequent development in 1942 into a concentration camp with the full resources of the nazi reich the book shows how danzig gdansk generally identified as the city where the second world war started became under albert forster hitler s hand picked gauleiter the vanguard of germanism in the east and with its disputed history the poster city for the third reich it reflects on the fact that danzig was close enough to supply stutthof with both prisoners initially local poles and jews as well as local men for its ss workforce throughout the study ruth schwertfeger draws on the stories of danziger and nobel prize winner günter grass to consider the darker realities of german nationalism that even grass s vibrant depictions and wit cannot mask schwertfeger demonstrates how german nationalism became more lethal for all prisoners especially after the summer of 1944 when thousands of jewish woman died in the stutthof camp system or perished in the death marches after january 1945 schwertfeger uses archival and literary sources as well as memoirs to allow the voices of the victims to speak their testimonies are juxtaposed with the justifications of perpetrators the book successfully argues that in the end stutthof was no less lethal than other camps of the third reich even if it was and remains less well known the tin drum one of the great novels of the twentieth

titans of modern german literature this collection of his stories astonishingly the first ever to appear in english shows him to have been a master of short fiction too bright magic includes all of döblin s first book the murder of a buttercup a work of savage brilliance and a landmark of literary expressionism as well as two longer stories composed in the 1940s when he lived in exile in southern california the early collection is full of mind bending and sexually charged narratives from the dizzying descent into madness that has made the title story one of the most anthologized of german stories to she who helped where mortality roams the streets of nineteenth century manhattan with a white borzoi and a quiet smile and the ballerina and the body which describes a terrible duel to the death of the two later stories materialism a fable in which news of humanity s soulless doctrines reaches the animals elements and the molecules themselves is especially delightful this manuscript argues for the importance of günter grass as a political thinker in addition to his status as a novelist and public intellectual capable of forming ethical responses to contemporary issues like neoliberalism and place of the petit bourgeoisie in social life i define grass s trajectory as a thinker through his novels and speeches primarily i draw attention to the role memory plays in grass s thought that his work

free city of danzig was established by the treaty of versailles as a mandate to be protected by the league of nations and its high commissioner in 1933 the nazi party took control of danzig and pursued a hostile and violent agenda aimed at overthrowing the league s high commissioner and subverting its constitutional protections sean lester an irish diplomat was the league s high commissioner and paul muller a young man fresh from university was his secretary during this tense period the story portrays the roles played by lester and muller as repeated crises engulfed danzig and high stakes confrontations led to diplomatic clashes and finally political betrayal their story vividly captures the struggle between rampant nazi ascendancy and the league s mandate to preserve danzig s fragile democracy through the eyes of lester and muller from their perch at the epicenter of the danzig conflict we watch hitler consolidating power and flexing growing german strength we see britain embracing a policy of feckless appeasement unwilling to confront the looming german menace and we are caught up in the hothouse atmosphere of a hesitant league of nations brimming with intrigue and infighting and ultimately failing to deliver on its promise of peace through diplomacy and collective security the story encompasses fast paced events in geneva berlin warsaw and london as well as danzig

itself capturing the drama of unfolding crisis that engulfed Europe in the 1930s on what we now know was the path to war this is a work of fiction but aficionados of interwar novels will relish the authenticity of the narrative most of the story's characters were real people and the events described actually happened Danzig brings them vividly back to life and invites readers to experience the drama of clashes within the Nazi leadership rivalries among Western politicians pursuing competing agendas and the lonely role of the League's High Commissioner trying to face down dangerous adversaries it is a gripping tale in a fateful time the struggle for the free city of Danzig the German picaresque and modernity reads the re-emergence of the picaresque narrative in twentieth-century German language writing as an expression of modernity and its social imaginaries Malkmus argues that the picaresque whose origins date back to the Spanish Renaissance and the Baroque age re-emerged as a reflection both of Germany's explosive modernizing processes between 1880 and 1930 and of the most barbarous implosion of modern civilization under National Socialism another reason for the fertility of this literary form at that particular cultural moment is rooted in the complexities of German Jewish relations and the history of Jewish assimilation in Central Europe a considerable number

Ḥayei adam an abridged code of jewish law was written by rabbi avraham danzig 1748 1820 and was first published in 1810 this code spread quickly throughout europe and the demand for it required a second publishing which the author printed in 1818 beyond a code of jewish law attempts to understand the implicit message of its author and discuss various approaches of its writer to both judaism and jewish law while the Ḥayei adam without any doubt unveils rabbi danzig to be a brilliant rabbinic scholar with a comprehensive knowledge of jewish law as well as a coherent and concise system of presentation it also expresses his great concern for the jewish community

and each individual Jewish aspects of this concern such as Hasidism, Musar, Kabbalah are explored in this extraordinary memoir. Nobel prize winning author Günter Grass remembers his early life from his boyhood in a cramped two room apartment in Danzig through the late 1950s when *The Tin Drum* was published. During the Second World War Grass volunteered for the submarine corps at the age of fifteen but was rejected two years later. In 1944 he was instead drafted into the Waffen SS, taken prisoner by American forces as he was recovering from shrapnel wounds. He spent the final weeks of the war in an American POW camp. After the war Grass resolved to become an artist and moved with his first wife to Paris where he began to write the novel that would make him famous, *The Tin Drum*. Full of the bravado of youth, the rubble of postwar Germany, the thrill of wild love affairs and the exhilaration of Paris in the early fifties, *Peeling the Onion* which caused great controversy when it was published in Germany reveals Grass at his most intimate. In this delightful sequel to *Peeling the Onion* Günter Grass writes in the voices of his eight children as they record memories of their childhoods of growing up of their father who was always at work on a new book always at the margins of their lives. Memories contradictory, critical, loving, accusatory they piece together an intimate picture of this most public

drum and from then on it is the means of his

bloodily away as drum succeeds drum oskar  
participates in the german postwar economic miracle  
working variously in the black market as an artist s  
model in a troupe of traveling musicians with the  
onset of affluence and fame oskar decides to grow a  
few inches only to develop a humpback but despite his  
newfound status and stature oskar remains haunted  
by the deaths of his parents afflicted by his  
responsibility for past sins and so assumes guilt for a  
murder he did not commit as an act of atonement and  
an opportunity to find consolation the rhythms of  
oskar s drums are intricate and insistent and they lead  
us often by way of shocking fantasies through the dark  
forest of german history through oskar s piercing  
outspoken voice and deformed little figure through the  
imaginative distortion and exaggeration of historical  
experience a pathetically hilarious yet startlingly true  
portrayal of the human situation comes into view  
keeping track of prolific authors who write fiction

series was quite challenging for even the most ardent fan until to be continued debuted in 1995 now readers will be happy that the soon to be released second edition has added 1 600 new books and 400 new series to be continued second edition maintains the first volume's successful formula that featured concise a to z entries packed with useful information including titles publishers publication dates genre categories annotations and subject terms among the genre categories that can be found in to be continued are romance science fiction crime novel horror adventure fantasy humor western war christian fiction and others this study extends the long established notion of Grass's Danzig trilogy to that of the Danzig quintet a literary project of epic proportions which explores the evolution of Germany's relationship to its Nazi past over a period of forty years the interlocking stories of *Die Blechtrommel* 1959 *Katz und Maus* 1961 *Hundejahre* 1963 *Örtlich betäubt* 1969 and *Im Krebsgang* 2002 are mediated by the memory and language of seven first person narrators using the dual conceptualisation of memory developed by Freud and Lacan reliving versus recollecting the past the author shows how these narrators' accounts assert the reality of the Holocaust as well as German wartime suffering while highlighting the reluctance of ordinary Germans to admit their involvement in the Nazi regime this

delineation of the complex relationship of three generations to their history is deepened by the intertextual nature of the quintet using the theory of peter brooks umberto eco shoshana felman and hayden white the study explores how grass s textual strategies encourage the reader to view all five works as one overarching narrative while simultaneously avoiding any literary or historical closure in the process the study places each book in the context of its moment of production and also considers the implications of grass s belated admission in august 2006 that he served with the waffen ss during the final months of world war two the career of günter grass began dramatically in 1959 with the publication of his first novel the tin drum brought instant fame to the thirty two year old author and led to his receiving the 1999 nobel prize in literature translated into dozens of languages the novel has sold over four million copies worldwide its status as a major text of postwar german literature however has not diminished its provocative nature in both style and content it continues to challenge scholars teachers and students this volume like others in the mla series approaches to teaching world literature is divided into two parts part 1 materials provides the instructor with bibliographic information on the text critical studies and audiovisual and internet resources part 2 approaches contains



eighteen essays on teaching the tin drum including three that discuss völker schlöndorff s 1979 film adaptation of the novel some of the topics covered are the historical context nazism world war ii the holocaust oskar matzerath as an unreliable narrator the imagery e g eels the virgin mary the use of german fairy tales and how grass s satirical treatment of germany speaks to postwar generations in 1990 günter grass a reluctant diarist felt compelled to make a record of the interesting times through which he was living following the fall of the berlin wall in november 1989 and the collapse of communism germany and europe were enduring a period of immense upheaval grass resolved to immerse himself in these political debates he travelled widely throughout both germanys the former east and the former west conducting a lively exchange with political enemies friends and his own children about all the questions posed by reunification his account gives the reader an unparalleled insight into a key moment in the life of modern europe seen through the eyes of one of its most acclaimed writers it also provides a startling insight into the creative process as the reader witnesses ideas for novels occurring and then taking shape from germany to germany is both a personal journal by a great creative artist and a penetrating commentary on recent european history by someone
