in a departure author regis debray redefines communication as the inescapable conditioning of civilization's meanings and messages by their technologies of transmission and lays the groundwork for a science of the transmission of cultural forms this book examines how ordinary users review cultural products online ranging from books to films and other art objects to consumer products the book maps different communities in institutional and non institutional settings which intersect with the genre of review especially in the social web where reviewing is conducted on platforms such as instagram youtube and vimeo the book drawing on the key concepts of cultural intermediation platformized cultural production and post professionalism looks at user generated content in lifestyle communities beyond the binary of professional and amateur production convinced that cultural criticism need not merely be an academic exercise but can help improve people's lives mark bracher proposes a method of cultural criticism which is based on the principles of psychoanalytic treatment and which aims to alter subjectivity and

behavior in this forceful and engagingly written book bracher first accounts for the failure of contemporary cultural criticism to achieve significant social impact he then offers a model of analysis that draws on lacan s theoretical insights into the structure of subjectivity and the psychological functions of discourse asserting that the use of this model can promote collective psychological change while cultural criticism has generally focused on texts bracher instead analyzes audiences actual responses to a variety of discourses from high as well as popular culture the political speeches of ronald reagan and jesse jackson anti abortion propaganda pornography keats s to autumn and conrad s heart of darkness through analyzing these responses bracher is able to uncover the unconscious identifications and fantasies of the respondents an intervention that he argues has the potential for altering subjectivity in his view such a method of cultural criticism is both unusually powerful and ethnically defensible since instead of attacking or upholding a group s values it reveals the psychological conflicts manifest in responses to particular texts lacan discourse and social change will be essential reading for students as well as specialists in such fields as cultural criticism feminist theory literary theory psychoanalytic criticism reader response criticism reader response criticism and lacanian theory the essays in logics of television are at the cutting edge of theoretical debate in the humanities the contributors rigorously engage the challenges of postmodern cultural criticism and theory an enlightening and solidly documented book of great value to those who would like to trace the ideological roots behind the most erratic and dramatic politics phases of modern germany american political science review if only because it presents the intellectual and emotional background to national socialism with rare clarity and penetrating analysis of its several and often sharply contrasting components the ably written and profoundly interesting book would be of importance with its useful footnotes selective bibliography and good index professor stern s study is american scholarship at its best international affairs critics against culture anthropological observers of mass society a collection of essays on the history of anthropology focused on benedict boas sapir and modernist thought by one of american anthropology s leading scholars explores the roots of anthropology s early involvement with the study of american society the essays making up this volume focused on the critique of mass society and the history of the culture concept examine boasian anthropologists as critics of mass society the book also includes two new unpublished essays one on alexis de toqueville and margaret mead the other on jules henry and richard hoggart handler offers a striking analysis of boasian cultural criticism and the intersection between anthropology american studies and cultural studies in homegrown cultural critics bell hooks and amalia mesa bains reflect on the innate solidarity between black and latino culture riffing on everything from home and family to multiculturalism and the mass media hooks and mesa bains invite readers to re examine and confront the polarizing mainstream discourse about black latino relationships that is too often negative in its emphasis on political splits between people of color a

work of activism through dialogue homegrown is a declaration of solidarity that rings true even ten years after its first publication this new edition includes a new afterword in which mesa bains reflects on the changes conflicts and criticisms of the last decade in a harsh uncaring world the family is valued as a source of warmth and stability at the same time we are increasingly compelled to recognize that families can be oppressive both physically and emotionally now in paperback catherine belsey s illustrated account of shakespeare s plays in conjunction with early modern images of adam and eve locates the construction of family values in cultural history and politics she shows the pleasures and anxieties generated in the period by the domestication of desire parental love and cruelty and the relations between siblings and discusses how shakespeare s plays explore these themes the bestselling author of no logo shows how the global free market has exploited crises and shock for three decades from chile to iraq in her groundbreaking reporting naomi klein introduced the term disaster capitalism whether covering baghdad after the u s occupation sri lanka in the wake of the tsunami or new orleans post katrina she witnessed something remarkably similar people still reeling from catastrophe were being hit again this time with economic shock treatment losing their land and homes to rapid fire corporate makeovers the shock doctrine retells the story of the most dominant ideology of our time milton friedman s free market economic revolution in contrast to the popular myth of this movement s peaceful global victory klein shows how it has exploited moments of shock and extreme violence in order to implement its economic policies in so many parts of the world from latin america and eastern europe to south africa russia and iraq at the core of disaster capitalism is the use of cataclysmic events to advance radical privatization combined with the privatization of the disaster response itself klein argues that by capitalizing on crises created by nature or war the disaster capitalism complex now exists as a booming new economy and is the violent culmination of a radical economic project that has been incubating for fifty years what do we think of when we think of literary critics enlightenment snobs in powdered wigs professional experts cloistered academics through the end of the 20th century book review columns and literary magazines held onto an evolving but stable critical paradigm premised on expertise objectivity and carefully measured response and then the internet happened from the editors of review 31 and 3 am magazine the digital critic brings together a diverse group of perspectives early adopters internet skeptics bloggers novelists editors and others to address the future of literature and scholarship in a world of facebook likes twitter wars and amazon book reviews it takes stock of the so called literary internet up to the present moment and considers the future of criticism its promise its threats of decline and its mutation perhaps into something else entirely with contributions from robert barry russell bennetts michael bhaskar louis bury lauren elkin scott esposito marc farrant orit gat thea hawlin ellen jones anna kiernan luke neima will self jonathon sturgeon sara veale laura waddell and joanna walsh this book seeks through an examination of the form and

content of his texts to extend our understanding of Adolf Loos and his role in the struggle to define the nature of modernity in Vienna at the turn of the nineteenth century it makes extensive use of primary sources including archive material and newspaper reports which serve to shed new light on the way in which Loos's writings are embedded in their socio-cultural context drawing on insights from German and Austrian studies sociology and cultural history this book offers a genuinely interdisciplinary approach to a figure who himself operated in an interdisciplinary fashion looks at influence of Gilbert Seldes on modern art criticism and shares his outlook on the social aspects of art this book examines the stories that corporations tell about themselves and explores the powerful influence of corporations in the transformation of cultural and social life six case studies draw on CEO memoirs annual reports management manuals advertising campaigns and other sources to analyze the self-representations and rhetorical maneuvers that corporations use to obscure the full extent of their power images of corporate character and responsibility are intertwined with the changes in local economy politics and culture wrought by globalization and neoliberalism the contributors to this volume describe the effects of specific corporate practices on individuals and communities and how activists and academics are responding to labor and environmental abuses the young American critics Randolph Bourne Van Wyck Brooks Waldo Frank and Lewis Mumford are well known as central figures in the Greenwich Village Little Renaissance of the 1910s and in the postwar debates about American culture and politics in Beloved Community Casey Blake considers these intellectuals as a coherent group and assesses the connection between their cultural criticisms and their attempts to forge a communitarian alternative to liberal and socialist politics Blake draws on biography to emphasize the intersection of questions of self-culture and society in their calls for a culture of personality and self-fulfillment in contrast to the tendency of previous analyses to separate these critics' cultural and autobiographical writings from their politics Blake argues that their cultural criticism grew out of a radical vision of self-realization through participation in a democratic culture and polity he also examines the young American writers' interpretations of such turn-of-the-century radicals as William Morris Henry George John Dewey and Patrick Geddes and shows that this adversary tradition still offers important insights into contemporary issues in American politics and culture Beloved Community reestablishes the democratic content of the young Americans' ideal of personality and argues against viewing a monolithic therapeutic culture as the sole successor to a Victorian culture of character the politics of selfhood that was so critical to the young Americans' project has remained a contested terrain throughout the twentieth century White extends his conception of United States law as a constitutive rhetoric shaping American legal culture that he proposed in *When Words Lose Their Meaning* and asks how Americans can and should criticize this culture and the texts it creates in determining if a judicial opinion is good or bad he explores the possibility of cultural criticism the nature of conceptual language the character of

the perfect undergraduate supplemental text for such courses as media studies literary criticism and popular culture a brilliant collection of essays by a young writer who is already a star in the intellectual firmament as william deresiewicz has written in harper s magazine mark greif is an intellectual full stop there is much of lionel trilling in greif much also of susan sontag what he shares with both and with the line they represent is precisely a sense of intellect of thought of mind as a conscious actor in the world over the past eleven years greif has been publishing superb and in some cases already famous essays in n 1 the high profile little magazine that he co founded these essays address such key topics in the cultural political and intellectual life of our time as the tyranny of exercise the tyranny of nutrition and food snobbery the sexualization of childhood and everything else the philosophical meaning of radiohead the rise and fall of the hipster the impact of the occupy wall street movement and the crisis of policing four of the selections address directly and unironically the meaning of life what might be the right philosophical stance to adopt toward one s self and the world each essay in against everything is learned original highly entertaining and from start to finish dead serious they are the work of a young intellectual who with his peers is reinventing and reinvigorating what intellectuals can be and say and do mark greif manages to reincarnate and revivify the thought and spirit of the greatest of american dissenters henry david thoreau for our time and historical situation the subject of this book is the various explicit and particular critical conceptions of and articulations about culture that have influenced our common understanding of ourselves and our societies it provides an introduction to cultural studies in terms of economic and political power professor belsey explains the views of recent theorists including jean françois lyotard judith butler and slavoj zizek in order to take issue with their accounts of what it is to be human historically australian scholarship on race has focused on racial oppression and discrimination of non whites however these essays look through the prism of whiteness studies a theoretical framework of race studies represented in international scholarship since the 1990s the essays reveal the many ways that whiteness is socially and discursively constructed this book comes to fruition at a time of political and social conservatism in australia where discussions of race and immigration have taken a reactive and conservative turn and white ownership of the nation and the guise of mutual obligation seeks to deny that race has any relevance in the distribution of resources and life chances at the same time discussions about indigeneity and immigration continue to highlight the importance of race to national identity belonging and ownership the essays engage critically with the meanings of whiteness and the location of its social and discursive construction from a variety of dis bringing together the work of scholars in many disciplines women in the metropolis provides a comprehensive introduction to women s experience of modernism and urbanization in weimar germany it shows women as active participants in artistic social and political movements and documents the wide range of their responses to the multifaceted urban culture of
