fulfilled life no matter your religious affiliation adapted from jacket once upon a time there was a little mouse house it was like a doll s house but not for dolls for mice not proper mice but a flannel he mouse and she mouse with beady eyes and bristle whiskers who stand quite still propped on their hind legs in the sitting room mary knows real mice run and scamper and disappointed with her new gift she puts the mouse house away in her room meanwhile down in the basement a real mouse named bonnie has been jostled out of her woefully inadequate flowerpot home by her older brothers and sisters overlooked by her harried parents and desperate for shelter bonnie ventures upstairs and finds the mouse house and before too long what was a miniature make believe house becomes a marvelously messy home for proper mice who know how to play much to everyone s delight in this sensitive and superbly crafted memoir one of the foremost english language authors of modern times rumer godden chronicles her early life in india and england she paints a vivid picture of her childhood in the early 1900s in narayangunj a village in undivided bengal where her father worked with the brahmaputra steam navigation company and her early forays into writing she movingly recounts the pain of being forced to return to england to complete her education and the horrors of being bullied by teachers and older girls in a convent but also her joy at finding a mentor who encouraged her writing after her return to india in 1925 life continued to be tumultuous she faced social censure for allowing anglo indian children in her dance school in calcutta and her marriage with a stockbroker laurence foster was an unhappy one the unexpected success of rumer s first novel black narcissus left laurence insecure and he deserted her and their two daughters rumer s courage and resilience shine through as she writes about her decision to pay off her husband s debts and to move to kashmir with her daughters there they lived in a houseboat till rumer bought an abandoned house and began making a living by selling vegetables and medicinal herbs from her garden but just as they were getting used to life in kashmir despite hostility from the locals a catastrophe forced them to return to london bursting with vibrant imagery and a love for life a time to dance no time to weep is an unforgettable account of the unconventional life of a celebrated writer and also of india under british rule from one of the greatest novelists of the american west comes a surprising and riveting story set in montana and in new york during the harlem renaissance drawing on the characters from doig s most popular work rumer godden s the diddakoi won the 1972 whitbread children s book award everyone in kizzy s town hates her because she s half gypsy a diddakoi but kizzy doesn t care all she needs is gran and her horse joe but when gran dies and their wagon burns down kizzy is all alone no one wants to look after her and her beloved joe might get sent to the knacker s yard can kizzy survive in a hostile world and save joe here is a biography whose eccentric genius perfectly matches that of its subjects penelope fitzgerald tells the lives of four extraordinary englishmen her father and his brothers with style and wit here is the story of a deeply fascinating family mind shared by four brothers and passed along to their remarkable biographer the mother superior of an irish convent reviews her life in flashbacks and makes a psychological study of herself for more than a century from 1900 to 2006 campaigns of nonviolent resistance were more than twice as effective as their violent counterparts in achieving their stated goals by attracting impressive support from citizens whose activism takes the form of protests boycotts civil disobedience and

other forms of nonviolent noncooperation these efforts help separate regimes from their main sources of power and produce remarkable results even in iran burma the philippines and the palestinian territories combining statistical analysis with case studies of specific countries and territories erica chenoweth and maria j stephan detail the factors enabling such campaigns to succeed and sometimes causing them to fail they find that nonviolent resistance presents fewer obstacles to moral and physical involvement and commitment and that higher levels of participation contribute to enhanced resilience greater opportunities for tactical innovation and civic disruption and therefore less incentive for a regime to maintain its status quo and shifts in loyalty among opponents erstwhile supporters including members of the military establishment chenoweth and stephan conclude that successful nonviolent resistance ushers in more durable and internally peaceful democracies which are less likely to regress into civil war presenting a rich evidentiary argument they originally and systematically compare violent and nonviolent outcomes in different historical periods and geographical contexts debunking the myth that violence occurs because of structural and environmental factors and that it is necessary to achieve certain political goals instead the authors discover violent insurgency is rarely justifiable on strategic grounds features intricately detailed bas relief collage spreads of dwellings in other world regions and historical times to explain how different people live and have lived from a village house in south africa that tells the story of its family to a floating green house in the netherlands 20 000 first printing the bride comes to yellow sky is an 1898 western short story by american author stephen crane originally published in mcclure s magazine it was written in england the story s protagonist is a texas marshal named jack potter who is returning to the town of yellow sky with his eastern bride potter s nemesis the gunslinger scratchy wilson drunkenly plans to accost the sheriff after he disembarks the train but he changes his mind upon seeing the unarmed man with his bride stephen crane 1871 1900 was an american novelist short story writer and poet who is often called the first modern american writer the great interest of jocelyn playfair s book for modern readers is its complete authenticity set sixty years ago at the time of the fall of tobruk in 1942 one of the low points of the war and written only a year later when we still had no idea which way the war was going as a subculture cloistered monastic nuns live hidden from public view by choice once a woman joins the cloister and makes final vows she is almost never seen and her voice is not heard her story is essentially nonexistent in the historical record and collective public history from interviews conducted over six years abbie reese tells the stories of the poor clare colettine order a cloistered contemplative order at the corpus christi monastery in rockford illinois seldom leaving their 25 000 square foot gated enclosure members of this community embrace an extreme version of poverty and anonymity a separation that enables them to withdraw from the world to devote their lives to prayer this removal they contend allows them to have a greater impact on humanity than if they maintained direct contact with loved ones and strangers dedicated to god explores individual and cultural identity through oral history interviews with several generations of nuns focusing on the origins and life stories of the women who have chosen to become members of one of the strictest religious orders but the narrative is also one of a collective memory and struggle against extinction and modernity a determination to create community within the framework of

ancient rules the author's stunning photographs of their dual worlds religious and quotidian add texture to the narrative this artistic and ethnographic work highlights the countercultural values and dedication of individuals who at incredible personal cost live for love of god and humanity out of faith in what cannot be seen and with the belief that they will be rewarded in the afterlife by the author of black narcissus one of our best and most captivating novelists philip hensher sophie an english ingénue with two children arrives in himalayan kashmir to set up home in a tumbledown cottage surrounded by flowers and herbs settling down to live quietly frugally and peacefully with her new neighbours she is unaware of the turmoil her arrival provokes as the villagers compete fiercely for her patronage sophie's cook makes a drastic bid to secure his position and the unwanted consequences are catastrophic the disappearance of a majestic thoroughbred unites a community in 1930s india in one of the greatest horse books ever written moving and highly original lauren st john author of the white giraffe in calcutta india john quillan cares for racehorses belonging to wealthy owners and mother morag who lives just down the road and leads a group of nuns working with calcutta's poor loves to watch these beautiful animals in action now a new thoroughbred dark invader has been shipped from england rejected after a losing season in which he didn't live up to his owner's expectations a beautiful creature with rippling muscles and satin skin dark invader is gently handled with love in his new home and before long he is poised for victory in the viceroy cup the country's most famous race but just days before the event he disappears and a desperate effort to find him begins from rumer godden the award winning author of such classics as the greengage summer and black narcissus as well as a number of beloved children's books the dark horse is a moving and suspenseful story set in a fascinating historical era this much loved english novel from rumer godden is reminiscent of the secret garden telling a fairy tale esque story about neighborhood children and a mysterious garden in post wwii london an emergency meeting of the mortimer square garden committee has been convened to discuss a most alarming matter someone has been digging in the garden and making off with buckets of dirt miss angela chesney is sure that a gang of boys from run down catford street is to blame but angela's sister olivia isn't so sure olivia has always wondered why the neighborhood children the sparrows she sometimes watches from the window of her house are kept out of the private garden don't they have a right to enjoy the place too but neither angela nor olivia has any idea what sent the neighborhood waif lovejoy mason and her few friends in search of good rich earth still less do they imagine where their investigation of the incident will lead them to a struggling restaurant a bombed out church and at the heart of it all a hidden garden an extraordinarily gifted writer who manages to infuse her novels with a special magic of their own boston herald a novel depicting life in brede abbey a benedictine convent as seen by a new inmate tracy quinn daughter of a screen star and raised on film sets around the world returns to her adored family home a country house named china court her grandmother's recent death has set in motion events that threaten tracy's future and the very existence of china court as tracy fights to save the old house inhabited by five generations of quinns the ancestors who created it are evoked profligate faithless jared eliza the embittered spinster and ripsie an outcast orphan who rose to become the powerful matriarch the miniature in her books contains by reflection the vastness of the world

this is surely the reason why her work has given so much pleasure to generations in many lands and continues to do so anita desairumer godden s follow up to a time to dance no time to weep the evocative story of her childhood and adolescence in early twentieth century india a house with four rooms begins with her return to post war england with characteristic honesty wit and elegance rumer describes the london of the 1950s and trying to make a living as a writer along with raising a family through her unwavering commitment to the pen and steadily growing fame she paints a fascinating picture of the literary and film world that came to fete her she tells stories of her many houses and her quest for a room of her own she also recounts her travels to america her time in india during the filming of the river with french director jean renoir noting the presence of a young satyajit ray and almost falling prey to a misguided mob the origins of her novels and their reception and her relationship with james haynes dixon her second husband her craftsmanship is always sure her understanding of character is compassionate and profound her prose is pure delicate and gently witty new york times doone penny is a child with a gift he was born to dance but though others recognise his talent there is little encouragement from his family his mother preens over his pretty sister crystal also a dancer but fiercely competitive and vain doone s father would never allow a son of his to have ballet lessons and his brothers think he s a sissy but doone has passion and ambition beyond his years and knows he can succeed if only he is given the chance if he can make it into queen s chase her majesty s junior ballet school he ll show them all the motto was pax but the word was set in a circle of thorns peace but what a strange peace made of unremitting toil and effort bruised by tragedy philippa talbot leaves behind a successful career with the civil service for a new calling to join an enclosed order of benedictine nuns in this small community of fewer than one hundred women she soon discovers all the human frailties jealousy love despair but each crisis of heart and conscience is guided by the compassion and intelligence of the abbess and by the sisters shared bond of faith and ritual away from the world and yet at one with it philippa must learn to forgive and forget her past from the new york times bestselling author of the greengage summer two english sisters lives are transformed when their father brings them to india at fifteen and twelve the daughters of sir edward gwithiam of the diplomatic service have already seen more of the world than most children their age but when una and her younger sister halcyon are summoned from their english boarding school to join their father in new delhi they encounter a reality unlike anything they have ever experienced for hal india is a glorious adventure filled with exotic sights and sounds and a host of interesting new people but una feels like an outsider in this world of ingrained racial prejudice and cultural elitism left over from the days of the british raj though no longer a child she is expected to submit to the will of a eurasian governess the calculating and beautiful alix lamont whose relationship with the girls father appears more intimate and troubling than merely employee employer then ravi a young indian gardener brings a welcome light into una s life relieving her sadness and loneliness with poetry and compassion but what begins as a simple friendship soon blossoms into a love forbidden by society threatening to end in scandal and disaster based in part on rumer godden s personal experiences and informed by her love of the indian continent where she spent the better part of her early life the peacock spring is a beautiful and heartbreaking
